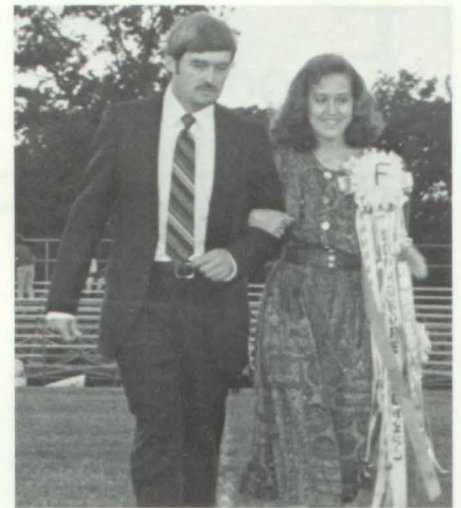


HOME-COMING

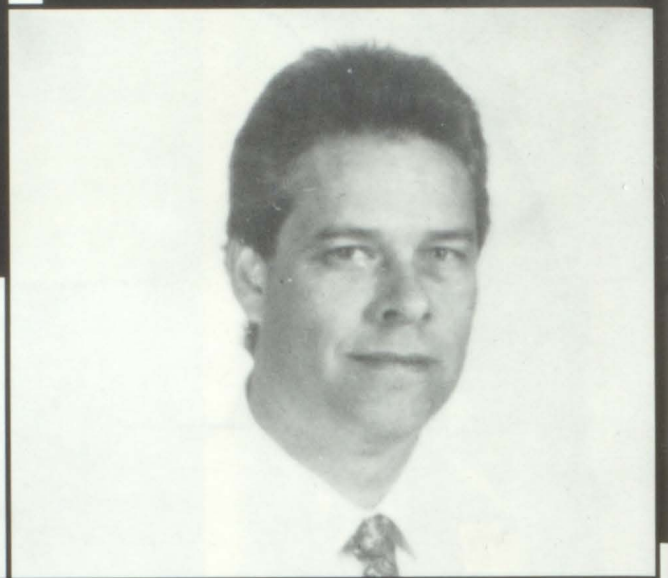
MIDDLE SCHOOL and HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

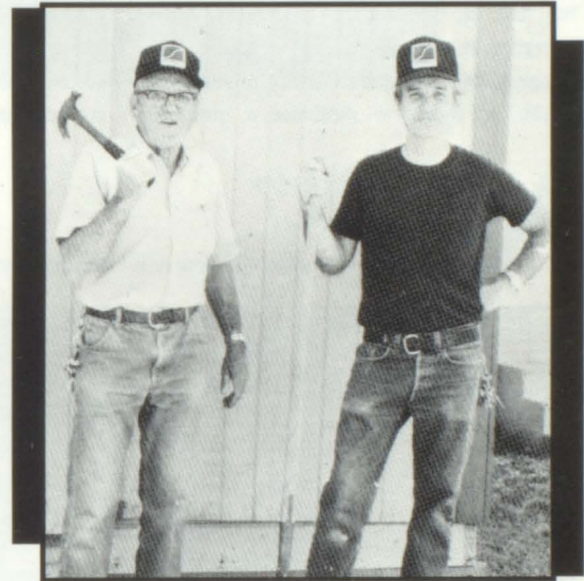
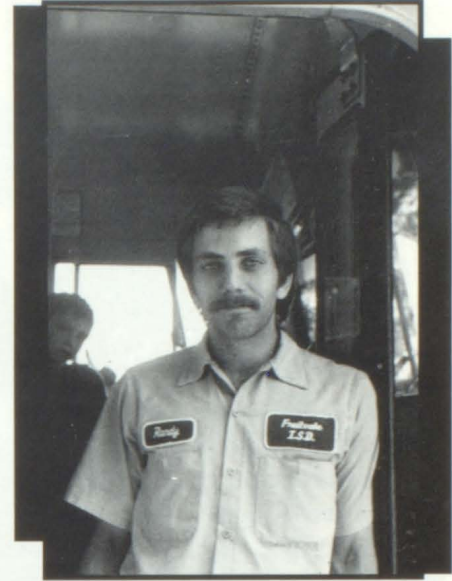
Bus Drivers, Custodians, and Food Service Workers . . .

The Life of a Teacher . . .

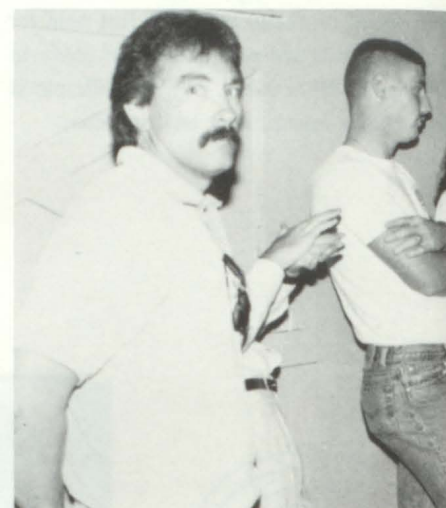

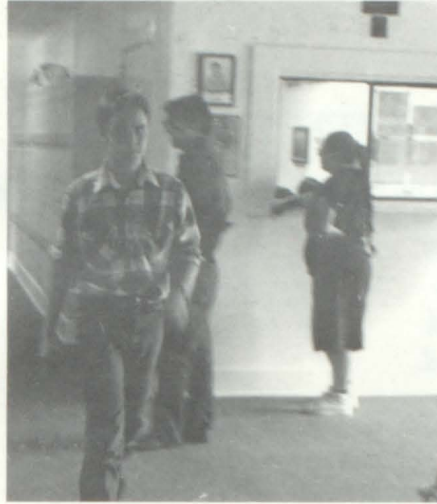
There's no substitute for interest.
